Suquamish Community Kitchen

Our parish is beginning to prepare and serve meals at the Suquamish Community Kitchen located at 18732 Division Avenue NE, Suquamish, WA 98392.

Dinner is provided every Wednesday evening from 5:00 to 6:30 p.m. Due to Covid, the kitchen is currently providing brown-bag, take-out dinners, but March will be the last month they do this. In April they will open back up for in-person dinners. They currently provide 140 drive-thru dinners and pre-Covid they were serving roughly 120 sitdown dinners each Wednesday. They expect the numbers will drop back down to 120 when they open up again.

As the host of the dinner, we need to plan the meal, purchase the food, and cook the food on-site, and the Suquamish Community Kitchen will reimburse us for up to \$275 for the food each time. Desserts can be baked off-site and brought with us. This can be done in many different ways and if there are people who would like to only shop, bake treats, or cook, and not necessarily serve or stay until the very end, that can be accommodated. Once they open up for inperson dinners, one should expect to be there from 4:00 to 7:30 p.m. or for some length of time in-between those hours. To begin with, we would like to host a dinner once a month, every other month. Right now we are set to host our first dinner on March 29th.

Presanctified Divine Liturgy

We are blessed to be able to serve the Presanctified Liturgy on Wednesdays and certain Fridays during the Great Fast. If you plan to receive holy communion at the Presanctified, you should be sure to fast from all food and drink at least from noon onward.

Lenten Confessions

Every parishioner intending to receive holy communion at Pascha and beyond needs to make at least one sacramental confession during the course of the Great Fast. Father John is available for confessions as always on Saturday evenings following the evening service and at other times by appointment. During the Great Fast, Father John will also be available for confessions with advance notice on Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m. prior to the Presanctified Divine Liturgy.

5th Annual Parish Camping Trip Update

But popular as well are a myriad of pseudospiritualities, each offering its own shortcut to spiritual satisfaction. His Life is Mine is a refreshing contrast. The book deals with prayers, and especially with the "Jesus Prayer" of Orthodox monasticism. Yet it is not simply a presentation of "techniques." The book is permeated by the awareness that prayer is not just the cultivation of a particular spiritual state, not the investigation of an abstract Idea or dissolution in an anonymous Whole, but an encounter with the personal Being, I AM, demanding in turn our own growth in person-hood.

Bookstore News

Looking for one or two books to enhance your Lenten journey? We have several titles in stock just for that!

• The *Lenten Triodion* provides the texts for the divine services for the pre-Lenten weeks of preparation, Great Lent, and Holy Week. Translated with an extensive and helpful introduction by Metropolitan Kallistos and Mother Mary, it provides many of the texts necessary to observe the great fast and to exercise the mind and spirit.

• *Great Lent – Journey to Pascha* by Rev. Alexander Schmemann. "This revised edition . . . examines the meaning of the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts, the Prayer of St. Ephraim the Syrian, the Cannon of St. Andrew of Crete and other neglected or misunderstood treasures of Lenten worship" (from the back cover).

• *Thirty Steps to Heaven* by Archimandrite Vassilios Papavassiliou, a priest of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of Thyateira and Great Britain. "Archimandrite Vassilios interprets the *Ladder* for the ordinary Christian without sacrificing any of its beauty" (from the back cover).

• Meditations for Great Lent, Reflections on the Triodion a second book by Archimandrite Vassilios. A small purple book, easy to tuck into a purse or glovebox of a car. "Using hymns from the Triodion and the Scripture readings appointed for the season, this book shows us how to make our fast acceptable: to fast not only from food but from sin; to fast with love and humility, as a means to an end and not an end in itself" (from the Ancient Faith website).

• *The Lenten Spring* by Fr. Thomas Hopko of blessed memory. From the Ancient Faith website:

> Forty meditations on Great Lent. revealing, in a simple, clear and beautiful manner, its true meaning. In his meditations, Fr Hopko draws on his long experience as a pastor and teacher, working with young and old throughout the country, to present to the modern reader the relevance of the Church's two-thousand-year-old tradition of preparing to greet our Lord's Resurrection. In his work he also makes extensive use of all facets of the church tradition: inspiring scriptural and liturgical passages from the Lenten services, the spiritual wisdom of the ancient saints and fathers, as well as the teachings of modern guides to the Christian life. All Christians who undertake the yearly journey to the blessed Pascha of our Lord will find inspiration and guidance in these meditations. All can enjoy reading and rereading them and share in the profound thoughts of the author as they make their own spiritual way through this holy season.
