If you are not familiar with the Orthodox Church, you may see some things that are new to you—icons and incense, the sign of the cross, veneration of the saints, and a lot of standing. These elements have been part of traditional Christian worship from ancient times. They reflect the heavenly nature of the Church.

While some Christians are content to agree to disagree, we believe true unity will occur only when modern Christians are reconciled to the ancient Church, with its faith and life delivered "once, and for all." In light of this, we respectfully request that rather than partaking of the Eucharistic Chalice, our non-Orthodox guests join us in receiving the *antidoron*—or blessed bread—served at the end of the Divine Liturgy.

Tone 2 Troparion (Resurrection)

When <u>Thou</u> didst descend to death, O Life im<u>mor</u>tal, Thou didst slay hell with the splendor of Thy <u>God</u>head. And <u>when</u> from the depths Thou didst <u>raise</u> the dead, all the powers of <u>heav</u>en cried out://

"O Giver of life, Christ our God, glory to Thee!"

Tone 5 Troparion (Church)

O God-wise Elizabeth,

with humility thou didst hide thy nobility and <u>honor</u> Christ especially by imitating the labors of Martha and <u>Mary</u>. As a <u>sacrifice</u> to God, thou didst arm thyself with works of mercy, <u>patience</u>, and love.

Seeing thy life of good works and suffering, we sincerely beseech thee, our true <u>teacher</u>.

O Venerable Martyr, Grand Duchess E<u>liza</u>beth, // entreat Christ our <u>God</u> to enlighten and <u>save</u> our souls.

Tone 8 Troparion (Martyrs)

Having slain the <u>fiery</u> ragings and fierce movements of the passions through their ascetic <u>la</u>bors,

the Martyrs of <u>Christ</u>, Menas, Her<u>mog</u>enes, and Eugraphus, received grace to dispel the aff<u>lic</u>tions of the infirm and to work wonders both while a<u>live</u> and after death.

It is a <u>truly</u> great <u>won</u>der that naked bones pour forth <u>healing</u>.// Glory to our <u>only</u> <u>God</u> and Creator!

Tone 2 Kontakion (Resurrection)

Hell became afraid, O almighty <u>Savior</u>, seeing the miracle of Thy Resur<u>rection</u> from the tomb! The <u>dead</u> arose! Creation, with Adam, beheld this and rejoiced with Thee,//

and the world, my Savior, praises Thee forever.

Tone 2 Kontakion (Church)

Who can tell of thy great acts of faith,
O long suffering Grand Duchess Elizabeth,
while enduring death in the depths of the earth,
thou didst radiate the brightness of Paradise.
Rejoicing in psalms and hymns, thou didst pray with the angels for
thy torturers,

"O Lord forgive them for they know not what they do." //
O Christ our God, through her prayers, have mercy, and save
our souls.

Tone 1 1st Kontakion (Martyrs)

Let us sing <u>praise</u> in honor of the glorious <u>Me</u>nas, and of his companions, the holy Hermogenes and Eugraphus. For they have <u>hon</u>ored the Lord and fought for His <u>glory</u>. They are worthy of numbering with the Angels in <u>heaven</u>,// and are bountiful in their <u>mir</u>acles.

Tone 6 Steadfast Protectress

Steadfast Protectress of <u>Christians</u>, constant advocate before the <u>Creator</u>, despise not the entreating cries of us <u>sinners</u>, but in thy goodness come speedily to help us who <u>call</u> on thee in faith,

hasten to hear our petition and to intercede for us, O <u>Theotokos</u>,// for thou dost always protect those who <u>honor</u> thee.

Today's Scripture Readings

The Lord is my strength and my song; / He has become my salvation. (Ps. 117:14)

Epistle Reading—Ephesians 6:10–17

Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places. Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand. Stand therefore, having girded your waist with truth, having put on the breastplate of righteousness, and having shod your feet with the preparation of the gospel of peace; above all, taking the shield of faith with which you will be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked one. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

Gospel Reading—Luke 17:12-19

And as he entered a village, he was met by ten lepers, who stood at a distance and lifted up their voices and said, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us." When he saw them he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went they were cleansed. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice; and he

fell on his face at Jesus' feet, giving him thanks. Now he was a Samaritan. Then said Jesus, "Were not ten cleansed? Where are the nine? Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" And he said to him, "Rise and go your way; your faith has made you well."

Today's Commemorations

The Holy Martyrs Menas, Hermogenes, and Eugraphus

Both Menas and Hermogenes were born in Athens. They both lived in Byzantium, being held in great honor by the emperor and the people. Menas was known for his great learning and eloquence of speech and, although he acted outwardly as a pagan, he was a convinced Christian in his heart. Hermogenes was Eparch of Byzantium and acted as a pagan both inwardly and outwardly, but he was compassionate and performed many good deeds. When a dispute flared up between the Christians and the pagans in Alexandria, Emperor Maximin dispatched Menas to calm the disturbance and to root out the Christians from the city. Menas went and restored peace, but he declared himself a Christian and converted many pagans to the true Faith by his eloquence and many miracles. Hearing of this, the emperor sent Hermogenes to punish Menas and to smother Christianity. Hermogenes brought Menas to trial, cut off his feet and tongue, gouged out his eyes, and then cast him into prison. In prison, the Lord Jesus Himself appeared to Menas, healing and comforting His suffering servant. Seeing Menas miraculously healed, Hermogenes was baptized. He began to preach the powerful Christian Faith and was consecrated as Bishop of Alexandria. Then the enraged Maximin went to Alexandria himself and subjected Menas and Hermogenes to cruel tortures, which they courageously endured, helped by God's grace. Beholding the bravery of these soldiers of Christ and the miracles of God upon them, Eugraphus, secretary and friend of St. Menas, appeared before the tribunal and cried out to the emperor's face: "I too am a Christian!" The emperor became enraged, drew his sword and beheaded St. Eugraphus. Following this, the evil emperor ordered the executioner to behead St. Menas and St. Hermogenes. Their holy relics, thrown into the sea, miraculously floated to Constantinople, where the bishop, to whom this was revealed in a dream, solemnly met them and honorably buried them.

The Nicene Creed: the Symbol of Faith (sung together)

I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and of all things visible and invisible.

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the Only-begotten, begotten of the Father before all ages: Light of Light, true God of true God; begotten, not made; of one essence with the Father; by Whom all things were made; Who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven, and was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and became man; and He was crucified for us under Pontius Pilate, and suffered, and was buried; and the third day He rose again, according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heaven, and sits at the right hand of the Father; and He shall come again with glory to judge the living and the dead; Whose Kingdom shall have no end.

And in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the Giver of Life, Who proceeds from the Father; Who with the Father and the Son together is worshipped and glorified; Who spoke by the prophets.

In one Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church. I acknowledge one baptism for the remission of sins. I look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Pre-Communion Prayers (said together)

I believe, O Lord, and I confess that Thou art truly the Christ, the Son of the Living God, Who camest into the world to save sinners, of whom I am first. I believe also that this is truly Thine own pure Body, and that this is truly Thine own precious Blood. Therefore I pray Thee: have mercy upon me and forgive my transgressions both voluntary and involuntary, of word and of deed, of knowledge and of ignorance. And make me worthy to partake without condemnation of Thy most pure Mysteries, for the remission of my sins, and unto life everlasting. Amen.

Of Thy Mystical Supper, O Son of God, accept me today as a communicant; for I will not speak of Thy Mystery to Thine enemies, neither like Judas will I give Thee a kiss; but like the thief will I confess Thee: Remember me, O Lord in Thy Kingdom.

May the communion of Thy Holy Mysteries be neither to my judgment, nor to my condemnation, O Lord, but to the healing of soul and body. Amen.
